Part III: Comprehension Questions

Question #1: The three questions facing the U.S. during Reconstruction and some of the points of view as to how to address the questions are listed below. This should be taken as a guide, students may include additional information or paraphrase their answers.

1. What should the U.S. government do with the ex-Confederates?
  - Ex- Confederates should be pardoned and welcomed back into the Union
  - Ex- Confederates should be denied some citizenship rights because of their rebellion.
2. How should the U.S. government bring the Southern states back into the Union?
  - The Southern states should be punished for seceding from the Union.
  - The Southern states should be allowed to rejoin the Union as though nothing happened.

3. What should happen to the newly freed Black Southerners?
  - Black Southerners should become U.S. citizens and gain full citizenship rights.
  - The U.S. government shouldn't do anything special to support the freed people.
